# Rector's Report: "Faithful Ministry as 'Showing Up'"

Building for the future looks like showing up now. In his book The Confessions, St Augustine talked about our understandings of time in a way that I'll never forget. He said that our natural understanding of time is of its passing. There is a past, a present, and a future. The problem, he said, is that it's a faulty understanding. The past, he said, is a memory of time that is no more. The future is a guess about time that may be. The only time that truly exists, he said, is the present. This is the only time in which we can choose to be faithful to God. The past has hopefully taught us much. And, certainly, we have to give thought to - and prepare for - the future. But the only time in which we can act, is now.

Many of you have asked me over the last year, "How can I best help?" I'll be honest – that is my favorite question to be asked. The person who asks that question has the interest of this community in mind. They are in touch with the part that they can play in the corporate life of CEC. And they "get" that, for us to move intentionally toward some hoped for future, requires for us generally to be moving in sync with each other.

The answer to this question – what can I do? – at least generally speaking, is this: show up. Be here on Sundays for worship. Stay after the service for coffee hour (it's about building

relationships, not coffee). Be here for formation opportunities (such as the Lent program on Wednesday evenings in Lent). Sign up for outreach opportunities. Show up for social events. Be part of a team that organizes these moments. I promise you that, if you make yourself a person who shows up, you'll be changed.

Showing up is not only the best way to be a healthy parish, but it's also the best way I can think of to grow as a parish. There are many things that clergy and staff can do to help bring people in the doors. But always – without fail – it's faithful people who show up, that keep people here.

Imagine being a potential new parishioner who shows up some Sunday. Generally speaking, let's say that they like what they've seen and what they heard in the service. So they take a chance and stay for coffee hour. When they arrive, they see 20 or so of the 120 people that were at worship. And maybe only one of the 20 speaks to them. That experience communicated something to them. Either this church isn't really a "community" in the way they think they are. Or maybe they don't want to be a community. Or maybe I just don't fit in here. Maybe the same person comes to a formation opportunity, and there are five faithful people who showed up. That communicates something to them.


Either no one thinks this is worth their time, or this parish isn't really about forming themselves in the faith, etc.

Now, imagine those same settings, but the new person finding instead, 100 people crowded in the hallway and spilling into the library and down adjacent hallways for coffee hour, or a parish hall nearly filled for Christian formation. That communicates something very different to this person. It suggests that God is doing something in these people that I want to be part of. It's energizing, and it's contagious. That is who we're called to be. And it starts with all of us showing up.

My own goal for Christ Church is to do what I can do to help build a strong, healthy community of Christians here for many decades to come. What I ask you all to do, is to show up, and to be part of what God is doing here.

### Personal Growth in Ministry

This ministry began in August as an outreach effort to connect with parishioners and college students in a casual, welcoming environment. By working from a local coffee shop most Thursday afternoons, I've had the privilege of engaging in fruitful and heartfelt conversations. I'm excited to continue this ministry and extend Christ's presence beyond our church walls.

### 3. Morning Prayer on Facebook Live

In September, I began hosting Morning Prayer online Monday through Thursday. This practice has been personally enriching for my prayer life and has provided a new avenue for communal worship. I'm encouraged by the positive feedback and look forward to continuing this offering.

### **Junior Warden**

Similar to the previous year in 2023, Christ Church had multiple building projects, including a variety of major building repairs as well as improvements to the property. Below is a list of the larger projects in 2024. Thank you to the members of the Building & Grounds Committee for their expertise and advice when it comes to repairs and maintenance, and a special thank you to Todd Young and Jim Guldin who have volunteered their time and talent to fixing a multitude of items both large and small at Christ Church.

### Mortar, Stone, Cloister, Capstones, and Painting:

In 2023, MTS was contracted to begin major repairs to the mortar all around the church, along with many other fixes to the stone, cloister, and capstones. Part of this project extended into 2024 and was completed.

#### Hot Water Valves & Actuators:

New hot water valves and actuators were installed under the Sanctuary/Nave in February. These valves and actuators helped improve the temperature regulation throughout the worship space along with improving efficiency.

#### Hot water pump and motor replacement:

In March, one of the four hot water pumps/motors was replaced in the boiler room. These pumps are separate from the new boilers that were installed in 2023, and several of them have undergone replacement or repair in previous years. These pumps now undergo a yearly inspection and have their bearings maintained to extend the life of the motors and prevent failures.

### Chapel Plaster and Window Repair:

In March, significant plaster repairs were conducted in the chapel. Smaller repairs were also made in a few other areas in the church that were damaged by moisture. With the new mortar and sealing around the building, along with a new window in the chapel, we expect to have significantly fewer issues with plaster repairs for years to come.

#### Pew Removal:

In the Spring of 2024, the front pews were removed to allow for more space in the Sanctuary/Nave. We are grateful for the feedback and overwhelming support of our congregation in the decision. The removal of the front two pews has allowed for more space for our disabled members and visitors, and the added space has allowed for more worship and music opportunities.

#### **Front Stairs:**

The front stairs were removed shortly after Easter and were replaced with a new set of stairs. The previous stairs were awkward, and created a tripping hazard, on top of many years of wear and tear. Additionally, a new center railing was added, and the side railings were refabricated to fit with the new stair dimensions. Please give a big thank you to the Baird family at Christ Church who donated and fabricated the beautiful stone steps.

### Chiller/AC Fan Motor Replacement:

In September our chiller unit had several fan motors that reached the end of their lifespan. These fans and motors were integral in providing air conditioning to the entire building (with the exception of the Nave/Sanctuary). Additional preventative measures and inspections have been put in place to keep the system running and to extend the life of the fans and motors.

### Columbarium

The Columbarium at Christ Church is a facility that gives members of this church the choice of being inurned and memorialized in a Christian and historic setting in church. Members' names are engraved in marble, and their biographies are recorded in the Book of Memories, which resides in the Columbarium. Visitation is both convenient and inspiring, and the life story of each is available for future generations. For many good reasons, church inurnment is increasingly popular, and the facility at Christ Church is one of the finest!

For members interested in learning more, there are pamphlets available on the console in the Columbarium, or you can contact the church office. Board members will be happy to give you a tour and answer your questions. The cost of a niche is \$960.00, which includes the cost of engraving the marble cover, as well as the urn. Niches can be purchased in one lump sum or can be reserved by a deposit and payment

schedule. The price of \$960.00 can be broken down into an initial deposit of \$240.00 (25%) + \$20/month for three years, or four annual payments of \$240.00 each.

All monies received for the niches go to the Columbarium Endowment Fund, which becomes a perpetual endowment to our church, and is used to perpetuate the care and enhancement of the Columbarium at Christ Church.

In 2024 approximately 75 percent of the niches have been purchased by our members, leaving 59 left available. The total Columbarium fund account balance as of January 1, 2024, was \$181,368.51 and our ending account balance for December 31, 2024, was \$188,346.90. ### **Foundation**

The Christ Episcopal Church Foundation (CECF) is a non-profit charitable organization which exists solely for the benefit of the church and its many ministries. It is a separate entity with its own board and bylaws and works closely with the Vestry in support of the financial needs of the church. The CECF vision is to inspire the congregation to respond to the changing needs of the church for generations to come.

At the present time, the foundation manages separate funds composed of legacy/memorial donations of deceased members as well as generous donations from current members. It also monitors the investments of three separate entities which operate independently. All financial investments are handled by the Episcopal Church Foundation in conjunction with State Street Global Advisors. Local board members make no financial investment decisions which eliminates any conflict-of-interest concerns.

Twenty-twenty three (2023) was an important year for the foundation with the review of all accounts for accuracy of classification—endowed or not endowed—as well as confirmation of restrictions for use of each fund. In addition, after a thorough review of investment options, the board elected to affiliate with the Episcopal Church Foundation (ECF). This relationship has proved to be very fruitful regarding the growth of the fund as well as solid, dependable administrative support.

The foundation has contributed to the recent repairs of the external church structure and also for a new boiler. Amy Amason has placed records of the foundation activities online to provide an accurate record and to help new leadership to better understand the function of the foundation. The board met in July and November. Minutes and financial records are always available for review upon request.

A declared goal last year was to take the mystery out of the foundation to make it more transparent to the congregation with an ultimate goal of increasing the value of the principal. To this end, the ECF advised that a Planned Giving Program would be very helpful. The first step is the creation of a Legacy Society to recognize those individuals who have already made a commitment to the foundation and in this way encourage others to participate. This effort will begin in the spring of 2025 and will be headed by Tracy Hall and Robert Carolla. Stay tuned.

ductions brought new customers to shop with us. We also kept an open door throughout the year for the CEC staff to send to us those in need of clothing.

We celebrate our generous donors, who keep a steady stream of both quantity and quality donations coming to the shop. Many of them were our consignors. We consider their now donated clothing proof of the value of Next to New's contribution to the community. And the shop is very fortunate to be in the hands of managers and volunteers who continue to share their time and invest their energy to keep Next to New a viable not-for-profit outreach of Christ Church.

# **Outreach Committee**

The Outreach Ministry includes work supporting Bissett School, Rare Breed, the Sewing Guild, Newborns in Need, Safe to Sleep, Ambassadors for Children, the Lespwa Timoun Clinic in Haiti, the Council of Churches of the Ozarks, Crosslines, Eden Village, and the local refugee programs.

Our sack lunch ministry continues to grow. This year our office staff gave out 4,240 sack lunches. We started keeping track of the numbers beginning in 2022. That year we handed out 1,144 and in 2023 we gave out 2,943 lunches. We have also made specific sack lunches for the cold weather shelter this year, with a number of 150-200 meals served in December. These lunches are distributed once per month, and we will continue this program through March of 2025. Our Outreach Committee was blessed this year with a grant of \$3000.00 from the Diocese of West Missouri for sack lunches.

The Outreach Committee supports the Well of Life Food Pantry which Christ Episcopal Church helped to start in 2000 when 6 downtown churches saw a need to help the hungry. The numbers and amounts of food that they have handed out in 2024 are as follows:

### Haiti Missions

It's been another trying year for our friends in Haiti, but we must celebrate the fact that the Lespwa Timoun Clinic continues to see and serve patients regularly. Many of the hospitals around the capital have completely closed. We are one of the few clinics that has almost continually been open. Patients are seen by Haitian doctors and nurses, with extra support through zoom-like appointments with telemedicine communication. Light from Light, the stateside support organization continues to raise funds to support the clinic. Christ Church has given \$1000 a month for the clinic and we raised almost \$500 through our Quarter Tubes to provide the Plumpy Nut supplement for the nutrition program. A \$1000 grant was secured from the Diocese for the nutrition program, as well. The Brighter Haiti event in Springfield was canceled this year, but our Haiti connection was blessed with a very generous donation through the continued on pg. 10

#### Rare Breed

Rare Breed is a local non-profit that supports youth and young adults who are homeless or who are at risk of becoming homeless.
