# A Different Kind of Easter Vigil

The Great Vigil of Easter is perhaps the most important celebration of Holy Eucharist that we share in the Christian year. In it, the Paschal candle is signed and blessed for the new year. The ancient Exsultet is sung for the only time of the year. Salvation history is hinted at through a number of lengthy readings from the Old Testament. Our baptismal promises are renewed, and we proclaim that all of time in God's creation funnels into and out from the person of Jesus. Sounds pretty important, doesn't it?

But there is a problem. Few people attend this long service (2 hours +), which goes well into the evening before which so much happens on Easter morning. In 2024, 59 people joined us for that service, over 30 of which were choir members, clergy, acolytes, or EM's. So, as important as the message of the Great Vigil is, it isn't reaching many people in its current form.

I would like, therefore, to offer the vigil somewhat differently this year. It will take place in the garden at 7 PM on Holy Saturday (April 19th). It will be roughly an hour in length. All major parts of the service will be represented, although many of them in abbreviated form. We'll have refreshments to share (beer, wine, soda, etc) and we invite any who would like to do so to bring a snack or hors d'oeuvres to share.

The finding of Jesus' tomb to be empty was the first sign of a reality that would change the world. But it was first a moment of joy and wonder for Jesus' friends. Come celebrate this moment with your fellow Christ Church disciples, and help us to make this a night to remember.

## Credo - I Believe: The Creed in Worship and Music

In 2025, we celebrate a remarkable milestone: 1,700 years of the Nicene Creed. For centuries, this statement of faith has been at the heart of Christian worship, uniting believers across traditions and generations. It has shaped theology, liturgy, and—perhaps most beautifully—music. Few texts have inspired composers as much as the Nicene Creed, leading to some of the most powerful and moving choral works ever written.

At its core, the Nicene Creed is a communal declaration, affirming the core beliefs of Christianity. It's a text that has echoed through churches for generations, connecting worshippers around the world. But when set to music, the Creed takes on a new life—lifting the words beyond speech and into something deeply expressive, whether through soaring melodies, rich harmonies, or bold, dramatic textures. Throughout history, composers have approached the *Credo* in a variety of ways. Early chant settings gave way to the complex polyphony of Renaissance

masters like Palestrina and Byrd, whose interwoven vocal lines reflect the depth and richness of the text. Later, composers like Beethoven infused it with passion and grandeur in works like his Missa Solemnis, capturing the sheer magni-

tude of the Creed's declarations. Even today, new settings continue to emerge, proving that this ancient text still speaks to the hearts and imaginations of musicians.

For choirs, singing the *Credo* is both a challenge and a gift. Unlike other movements of the Mass, the Creed is long, intricate, and packed with meaning. It demands not just technical precision, but a deep connection to the words. Whether performed in the intricate counterpoint of Bach's *B Minor Mass*, the lush harmonies of a Romantic setting, or the bold rhythms of a contemporary composition, the *Credo* calls singers to do more than just perform—it invites them to proclaim, to embody, and to bring its message to life.

There's something powerful about voices rising together to sing "Credo in unum Deum." It's a moment of unity—between choir and congregation, between past and present, between music and belief. As we mark 1,700 years of the Nicene Creed, we celebrate not just its historical and theological significance, but its lasting presence in choral music. Whether in a cathedral or a concert hall, the Credo continues to inspire, uplift, and bring people together—just as it has for centuries.

### March Outreach: An Update on the Lespwa Timoun clinic in Haiti



Despite recent challenges in Haiti, there is still hope through our partnership with Light from Light and the Lespwa Timoun clinic. Our church continues to play a critical role in the clinic's work, serving vulnerable communities in and around Port-au-Prince. While 76% of hospitals in Haiti have closed, the clinic remains open, treating over 1,000 patients per month through its facility, community health workers, and Midwives Program. By God's protection, the clinic staff remain safe.

Thanks in part to your support, the clinic opened a Subacute Malnutrition Unit in 2024, providing inpatient care for children with severe malnutrition. This marks the clinic's first step into inpatient care. The Nutrition Program continues to serve hundreds of children monthly, and nine remote

nutrition posts extend their reach. A new doctor was hired last year to meet growing patient demand, and counseling services have expanded to support both patients and staff facing trauma.

Please continue to keep the staff in Haiti in your prayers. Pray that the Lord would move in the hearts of those of us who have the means to support this lifesaving work. Pray also for God's protection over all of the staff and their families, as the threat of gang violence continues to be a daily reality for them to navigate. Light from Light would like to convey their deep gratitude to the Christ Church community for our longtime support and partnership.

The Red Bag Brigade for March will be collecting items that we give out for sack lunches. We gave out over 5000 of these bagged meals in 2024! Our sack lunches consist of water, vienna sausages, small bags of chips, sleeves of crackers, and small fruit cups. We also give out bus passes to those who need them. If you are able to donate any of these items, please bring your donations to church and put in the box by office hallway. Thanks for helping look after our neighbors!





Helping Hands Casseroles: Would you like to lend a Helping Hand? As a part of the Hospitality Committee, we make and freeze delicious casseroles that we take to members of the church who have had a surgery, an illness, a baby, or for any other occasion that would warrant a "helping hand" by not having to fix a main course for dinner. 
